What an interesting night it was, the night I had the opportunity to meet Hamza Yassin, the wildlife photographer and TV personality in Clacton.

OK I will let on!!! No, I did not bump into him while I was having a roll along the seafront on my chair, and there he was photographing a seagull nicking my chips. He was the speaker at Clacton Arts and Literary Society evening, and you know me, any chance to have a photograph taken.

Hamza started by telling us about his early years in Sudan where he lived until he was eight years old. His parents had worked as gynaecologists and when they arrived in England he only knew four words of English. Two of which were please and thank you and the other two, pizza and chips. His knowledge of English came from watching David Attenborough's series The Life of Birds. His photographic memory helped despite his dyslexia. He was educated at Wellingborough School and achieved a degree at Bangor University in Zoology with Conservation and then a Masters in Biological Photography and imaging from the University of Nottingham. He thought wow, I have made it, I can get a job. No!!!

He refers to himself as the black sheep of the family, as all his siblings are in medical/science and he is a wildlife photographer.

When he was twenty-one, he moved to the Scottish Highlands to study the local wildlife and develop his career. Life wasn't easy, he ended up carrying another photographer's equipment on various expeditions, where his incredible knowledge of wildlife and their behaviour was soon noticed.

After a while and getting to know people, he appeared as Ranger Hamza on the children's channel CBeebies show Lets Go for a Walk and wrote a book based on the series. He went on to appear on The One Show and as a guest presenter on Countryfile. In 2021 he joined the BBC series Animal Park and in the same year he presented Scotland: Escape to the Wilderness, featuring four celebrities.

He also told us about the wonder of being a cameraman. Not!!!

Spending time being shaken about on safari in Kenya, including standing on the roof of a Land Rover, spotting for danger while it was being repaired after a breakdown. Couped up for eighteen hours in a home-built hide made of pallets and disguised as shrubbery, just to get the perfect shot. Time in a metal cage to get close shots of

Hippos, only to find in the morning that it had been destroyed overnight by the Bull Hippo. Filming in Canada in temperatures of – 40 C, where your fingers freeze pressing the shutter.

Understandably he did mention wining the glitter ball in 2022 with his professional partner Jowita Przstal (her first time on the series), despite finishing bottom of the leaderboard in the final. He was Wooooooow how did that happen. Thank you, public, for your vote.

The evening was so interesting and packed with incredible photographs and video, both as it appears on screen plus the funny bits behind the scenes. I could write on for ages.

He stressed at the end how important it is to encourage young people to appreciate the countryside, not just for their own wellbeing, but for wildlife and the future of the countryside.

Interesting fact. Why is Hamza's hair so long? He has not had it cut for 17 years as an act of rebellion against his mother. She used to give him a number two haircut

and one day he said that is it no more!

Next time you are out with your phone taking pictures. Take a moment to think of poor Hamza. Forty-five kilos of camera equipment costing more than £200,000 on his back. He is strong guy, plays rugby and participating in the Highland Games.

Hamza you are amazing in what you do educating us all and so down to earth with it. Thank you, what a night.

Sinfield finishes day one of is ultramarathon challenge



Ex-rugby league star Kevin Sinfield said he was "overwhelmed" as hundreds of people cheered for him at the finish of his first of seven ultramarathons in seven days in aid of motor neurone disease (MND) research.

Sinfield, 45, started his run from Bury St Edmunds Rugby Club, Suffolk, at 08:40 GMT and finished at about 15:00 at Portman Road stadium in Ipswich.

He is running in tribute to former Ipswich Town striker Marcus Stewart, who lives with the condition.

"I think everybody in Britain and the world wants people to get better, get healthier," he said.

"MND is something close to my heart with Marcus Stewart.

"It's great to see so many people from Ipswich coming out on this cold wintry day."

What is the 7 in 7 Challenge?

Sinfield was inspired by, and continues to run in memory of, his former Leeds teammate, Rob Burrow, who was diagnosed in 2019 and <u>died</u>, <u>aged 41</u>, in <u>June 2024</u>.

He is pounding the streets on seven routes in the UK and Ireland over seven days, from Monday 1 to Sunday 7 December, to raise money and awareness for those impacted by MND.

The challenge, known as 7 in 7: Together, will see Sinfield running an ultramarathon of at least 45km (27.9 miles) each day, in bursts of 7km (4.3 miles).

Each day is in honour of a local personality who has championed the cause, and, as in previous challenges, includes an extra-mile event when Sinfield joins members of the MND community.
